
Kia ora e te whaanau,

Wooden Arms - Mantle of the Expert

After many interruptions, we are finally on our way again and the tamariki and I are in the middle of researching NZ's immigration history from the perspective of the hall in our fictional story - Wooden Arms. As we work in our team called Te Kohinga Mārama - Gathering of Light and Understanding, we have accepted a fictional commission (job) to plan a grand reopening of the newly renovated hall in our story. In order to do that, we must find the descendants of the original owners of the hall, organise a special sculpture and plaque and plan the logistics for such an important event, making sure we are being culturally responsible in the process! Of course all of this is happening inside the imagined world of our story and we are learning to blend moments of drama, research and imagination to strengthen and deepen our learning.

So far we have worked out that the hall in our story was built in the Early 1800's because of the planks of timber, nails and tin used for the roof. We know that it probably became a church in the late 1820's - Early 1830's, when many of the missionaries who had come to Aotearoa established churches and encouraged people to follow their ideas and beliefs. We have been introduced to 'He Whakaputanga - Aotearoa's Declaration of Independence that was actually signed on 28 October 1835, 5 years before the Treaty of Waitangi was signed in 1840. We realised that these two documents were both important in our history but also important inside the fiction of our story because they helped us to understand why some decisions were made. We've found out that the NZ Co. were responsible for exaggerating the truth, promising things they couldn't deliver and encouraging many people from European countries to come to Aotearoa, which led to land being taken, fighting and lots of upset people. This historical information was important because it helped us understand why so many migrants from other countries ended up in NZ. We are currently working on creating a timeline, with information about people from Italian, Chinese, Indian, Pasifika and Muslim countries that decided to make Aotearoa their home.

Abby and Arlen were asked by the class to be our team leaders for this project and they are doing a wonderful job of guiding our class to make collaborative decisions during our TKM team meetings. Our work is challenging, creative and lots of fun. I'll post updates as we progress on our class Dojo.

Zones of Regulation

Zones of Regulation is a programme designed to help children identify how they are feeling and then take steps to 'regulate' their emotions and act positively to support themselves and / or their peers. We will begin this programme in week 4 and I will share more information at that time.

Our senior school EOTC is happening in Week 8: Monday 30 November - Friday 4 December.


Room 30, Room 22 & Room 4 will be working together during the week. More detailed information will come home shortly with permission slips for the various activities but below is a brief timetable of our week.
